

How to Participate

- 1. Complete five or more activities** in this Like to Hike log. Trail maps are available at the park headquarters, nature center, campground host sites and online. Activities can be modified as needed.
- 2. Limited-edition collector pins**, sponsored by the Friends of Peninsula State Park, are available for purchase. Those who complete five or more activities can purchase a pin for a reduced rate!
- 3. Record activities in this log.** Bring it to the park headquarters or the nature center. Park staff will stamp the log so you can purchase the pin at a discount.

The “Like to Hike” program encourages silent sports such as hiking, tracked-chair exploring, snowshoeing, running, biking, skiing, wildlife viewing, paddling, golfing and more, which promote health and park appreciation.

Celebrating 25 Years of Like to Hike Memories

Beginning in 2001, Like to Hike pins have been a collectible for park visitors, encapsulating the memories experienced on these 3,776 acres.

Over the past 25 years, the Like to Hike program has celebrated many features of the park, including foxes, the Niagara Escarpment, wood violets, bald eagles, nuthatches, rusty patched bumble bees and so much more. This year, we're celebrating YOU! Commemorating the first Like to Hike pin, we want to thank you for stepping up, visiting and caring for your state park.

As you complete these activities, take note of what you observe, as they may not stick around long. A monarch butterfly taking its last flight before migration, the first bloom of the dwarf lake iris wildflower or a maple tree losing its leaves before winter creeps around the corner.

We hope you continue this tradition, leaving only footprints, and taking only memories and the collector pin. So, get those boots on or reserve our all-terrain tracked wheelchair, and celebrate 25 years of fun!



Active & Accessible at Peninsula

Peninsula offers many accessible opportunities and amenities, including accessible campsites, trails, fishing piers, overlooks, shelters, picnic areas, the nature center and amphitheatres.

At Nicolet Beach you will find a beach access mat, universal changing table, accessible shelter, restroom and an inclusive playground. A beach wheelchair is also available for use.

Visit the Eagle Tower area and enjoy the view atop the 60-foot observation tower via the ramp (wheelchairs are available to borrow) or make a reservation to use the all-terrain tracked wheelchair on the nearby Sentinel Trail, a picturesque trail through the Maple Beech State Natural Area. The tracked chair can also be used on trails leaving from the White Cedar Nature Center.

All wheelchairs are free to borrow. Stop in the main office to check them out or call 920-868-3258 for more information.

The tracked wheelchair can be checked out via the Peninsula State Park Track Chair Reservation System. Visit dnr.wi.gov and search “open outdoors”.

1. Sentinel Trail

Date: _____ 2-mile loop

Easy trail through a forest of maple, beech and red pine. Trail signs interpret forest ecology. The tracked wheelchair can be checked out for use on this trail via the Peninsula State Park Track Chair Reservation System. Access by Eagle Tower.

2. Skyline Trail

Date: _____ 3-mile loop

Moderate trail with rolling hills. Watch for stone fences and open meadows; remnants of long-ago farms. Enjoy views atop the Niagara Escarpment at Sven Bluff Overlook, or down along the shoreline at the historic Camp Meenahga site. Access at Skyline parking lot or Sven Bluff Overlook.

3. Sunset & Hidden Bluff Trail

Date: _____ 4-mile loop

Part of our larger Sunset Bike Route. This trail is easier, with a packed gravel surface and some hills. Enjoy views of the shoreline, beach and lighthouse. The tracked wheelchair can be checked out for use on this trail. Access at nature center, Welcker's Point or Nicolet Beach.



4. Weborg Point

Date: _____

Pack a picnic lunch and enjoy views of the bay and Fish Creek harbor. Grab your binoculars and keep your eyes open for one of many warblers that migrate through the park, or hook a fish from the pier (fishing license required for persons 16 years of age or older).

5. Nature Center & Trail

Date: _____

Explore the White Cedar Nature Center and learn more about local flora and fauna and the park's history, or take the 0.5-mile self-guided interpretive trail to learn more about deer ecology. Find the DNR events calendar at the nature center or online at dnr.wi.gov/events for programs in the summer and fall.

6. Sunset Bike Route & A Picture Perfect Sunset

Date: _____

Pedal, wheel or trek all or part of the Sunset Bike Route (10 miles). The trail winds through wetlands, State Natural Areas and along miles of shoreline perfect for that sunset photo. Use caution on hills and curves and always ride single file.



7. Nicolet Beach Scavenger Hunt

Date: _____

Explore Nicolet Beach and the surrounding area and see how many items below you can find. Remember to leave no trace: please do not gather the items, but instead snap a photo or draw a picture to keep track.

- Birds nest
- Horseshoe Island
- A kayak on the water
- Robin
- Cedar tree
- Flat rock
- Wildflower
- Driftwood
- Chipmunk
- American beech tree
- Butterfly



8. Eagle Tower & Ramp

Date: _____ 20-45 minutes

Eagle Tower 3, constructed above the Niagara Escarpment, opened in 2021. Meander up the 850-foot accessible walkway and read signs full of fun information about the park and its natural history. At the top, you will experience a panoramic view of the park, surrounding islands and upper Michigan.

9. Yellow Loop (bike or hike / *ski trail in winter)

Date: _____ 1-mile loop

This is an easier trail that traverses gentle terrain through hardwood forests and old fields. Access from Highland Lot.

*Hiking is not allowed on colored trails when groomed for skiing.

10. Bats at Welcker's Point

Date: _____

During the daytime, Welcker's Point offers fantastic views out into Green Bay. If you stay past sunset, you can watch bats fly from their daytime roost to feast on insects. Bats emerge from the east side of the shelter building about 30 minutes after sunset.
